

CLASSIC GERMAN BEEF ROULADEN


"Get ready to savor the flavors of Germany with this classic Beef Rouladen recipe!

Thinly sliced beef, rolled with a savory mix of onions, bacon, and pickles, then slow-cooked in a rich gravy. A hearty, comforting dish that's sure to become a family favorite!

Here's the recipe:

Ingredients:

- 1.5 lbs beef top round, sliced into thin cutlets
- 1/2 cup finely chopped onion
- 6 slices of bacon, diced
- 1/2 cup finely chopped dill pickles
- 2 tbsp mustard
- 1 tsp dried thyme
- Salt and pepper to taste
- 2 tbsp all-purpose flour
- 2 cups beef broth



Instructions:

- 1. Preheat oven to 325°F (160°C).
- 2. In a pan, cook bacon until crispy, then set aside.
- 3. In the same pan, sauté onions until softened.
- 4. In a large bowl, combine cooked onions, pickles, mustard, thyme, salt, and pepper.
- 5. Lay beef cutlets flat, spread a tablespoon of the onion mixture on each, then roll up and secure with toothpicks.
- 6. In a large Dutch oven, brown the rouladen on all sides, then add flour to coat.
- 7. Gradually add beef broth, cover, and transfer to the preheated oven.
- 8. Braise for 2-3 hours or until tender.
