## I WAS A FRIED POTATO GUY!

As I move through these wonderful retirement years, I've never lost my taste for another helping of raw fried potatoes. I could eat them four or five times a week and never grow tired of what I consider a treat for the taste buds. At least once a week with a cooked breakfast including eggs and bacon, my wife, Virginia adds a helping of raw fried potatoes. While they are always delicious, I always keep hoping for twice as many as she manages to heap upon my plate.

Fried potatoes are probably my top choice for preparing potatoes although I'm told they are not the healthiest choice for meal time. Whether they are prepared with a little onion, bacon grease, or just fried brown in the skillet, my eyes light up and my stomach wants to shout out its approval anytime a plate of fried potatoes comes to greet me at the table.

As a farm boy, mother made raw fried potatoes often to accompany one of her home-cooked meals. As mother was peeling raw potatoes, the hands of my siblings and me were often extended while begging for a slice or two of raw potatoes. We liked to eat them raw with a little salt added as the peelings were dropping into mother's waste pan. And then in a little while when the meal with farm-raised meat was served, there was a lifting dish heaping with browned raw fried potatoes for each of the family to take a share to add to their dinner or supper plate.

Often in the mornings for breakfast there was bacon to be added to the skillet as eggs were fried in the bacon grease to please our hungry stomachs. Throwing in a few raw potatoes to be fried with the breakfast added another level of delight to what I sometimes referred to a "breakfast fit for a king!"

Back in the childhood years we raised our own chickens that laid plenty of eggs while potatoes were relatively cheap in the Berlin A&P grocery store and sometimes raised in our truck patch on our farm. While mashed potatoes, cooked saltwater potatoes with new lettuce, baked potatoes and scalloped potatoes were appreciated and tasty, nothing fit the meals better than another batch of fried potatoes. In my youth, French fried potatoes weren't on our menus, but in later years after first enjoying them in Mae Foor's kitchen, they also became a favorite potato for meal time.

Life has been an interesting journey with so many changes and introductions to new foods and inventions. Yet today nothing is more pleasing than when the electric stove heats up to another iron skillet containing raw fried potatoes that this fried potato guy delights in consuming!

In Megan's years as a board member of the Berlin Area Historical Society, she was continually busy working on one of our projects. She was an enthusiastic board member representing Stonycreek Township. She and Bob Schmucker were always thrilled to open up the Glade one-room school house to provide tours to individuals or groups. With her electronic tablet in hand, Megan would frequently look up useful information at our board meetings. She worked diligently recording the information collected by the inventory persons onto a computer to put the entries into our system.

She occasionally filled in for Betty Chaney, our secretary, by recording the minutes of our meetings. She often volunteered to take on projects that no one else felt comfortable or knowledgeable to do. One of the major projects that she completed was editing the society's cookbook in 2023. For some years she enjoyed being in charge of the entries for recipes and hints printed in our quarterly Memos.



Some of our board members will remember the summer of 2019 when more than a dozen of us and our spouses had the opportunity to tour her historical former farmhouse in Stonycreek Township. We enjoyed delicious food that day and tasty home-baked pie that was one of Megan's specialties.

Megan grew up in Castle Shannon and had a career in social services while raising her children and foster children. She worked as a case worker for the Department of Welfare, was a licensed social worker for the foster care program at the Children's Aide Home of Somerset County and retired as the ACCESS/Mental Health Coordinator for IU08. Also according to her obituary, Megan was passionate about family, community work, and learning. She was an amazing cook,

loved to bake, was a pie aficionado, an avid gardener, fond of canning and always had a knack for sewing. She knew how to make a house a home! Megan was an avid reader, historian, and greatly enjoyed genealogical research. She could fix just about anything, loved to travel, enjoyed collecting antiques and was a wonderful friend and caring neighbor to the Amish, a sit-down assistant, optimist and survivor till the end.

Megan was a devoted member of Unity United Church of Christ where she was active member of the Church Care Committee, a deacon, and past president of the consistory. She made time to volunteer at Camp Living Waters. Megan was so much more than this tribute conveys. This beautiful lady was our friend and enjoyed assisting so willingly with our projects.

Megan graduated from Keystone Oaks High School in 1966 as a straight-A student. She earned her bachelor's degree from West Virginia University in 1970 and prided herself on having her MSW Degree from the University of Pittsburgh in 2002 at the age of 52.

Megan was the loving mother of Sara Glessner, Christopher Glessner, and Andrew Glessner and the devoted foster mother of Joan Bickham and Tracey Blake


### THE RAY & JANE GLESSNER HOME HAS BEEN TORN DOWN

Ray A. Glessner (1918-1981) was a retired potato and dairy farmer. He was also a former director of Pro-FAC. He and his wife, Sarah Jane (Lambert) Glessner were members of Trinity United Church of Christ in Berlin. Their daughter, Barbara was married to the late Donald Poorbaugh, a retired teacher at the Berlin Brothersvalley High School. Their three children are Scott, Gail, and Eric Poorbaugh.

Ray's father, Harry H. Glessner (1890-1979) was a former teacher, farmer, and a retired field man for the U.S. Government Conservation Service. He was living in Miami, Florida at the time of his passing at 89 years.


