THE ORIGINAL SOUTHAMPTON ONE-ROOM SCHOOL HOUSE

The original one-room school house stood along Carter Hill Road after the bend in the roadway from the hunting camp, which once was owned by the George Cook family. The village of Southampton Mills was also located in this area.

Many years ago this structure burned to the ground and a second school house was constructed between Southampton Mills and Glencoe. Glencoe children attended the second school which was known both as the Northampton School and sometimes Southampton School.

The late Cloyce G. Coughenour was a former student at the original Southampton one-room school. He recalled fire destroying the school house. He showed Curator David Hay its former location where a few stones of the foundation were still in existence. Since then the foundation has been hidden by undergrowth. A little farther along Carter Hill Road, Dibert Road bears off to the left and travels up hill to the residence of Keith Dibert.



RAYMAN FELLOWSHIP CHURCH OF THE BRETHREN CLOSES ITS DOORS



The Rayman Fellowship Church of the Brethren has officially closed and sold its house of worship in Stonycreek Township to a Mennonite congregation. We have received a collection of the congregation's history; framed and identified pictures of the congregation in 1950 and 1962; a photograph album with pictures from the congregations 100th Anniversary in 1986; and other memorabilia.

In 1886 under the direction of Jacob Rayman, Christian Reitz, Benjamin Zerfoss and James Trent the brethren of the area raised a little white church building. Jacob and Sarah Rayman gave one-fourth acre of land from their farm. The same year a cemetery was established for the burial of the congregation's diseased. In 1935 several rods of land were added by Edward Rayman.

The congregation faithfully served the area for 139 years until officially closing its doors in 2025 at which time its house of worship was also sold.

HISTORY OF THE RAYMAN CHURCH

In the 1880's a number of families living east of Friedens had to ride rough roads, or walk to the Old Pike meetinghouse at Brotherton, which is about five miles. Thinking about this distance they had to travel, Jacob and Sarah Rayman challenged the brethren by giving ¼ acre of land from their farm. It was "to be used forever for the resting place of a meetinghouse of God." In 1886 under the direction of Jacob Rayman, Christian Reitz, Benjamin Zerfoss and James Trent the brethren of the area raised a little white church building. The same year a burial place was made for the deceased. In 1935 several rods of land were added by Edward Raymans.

The young people of the area would gather in the church under the light of the old pressure gas lamps and sing for several hours under the direction of Irvin W. Schrock. Much enthusiasm was shown by the young people in 1910, and at that time Annanias Beeghly organized the Christian Workers for the young and old.

From 1886 to 1920 the Elders of the church gave free ministry to the church. Being part of the Brothersvalley Congragation thay decided in the direction of paid ministry. Ministers who served the church were; Rev. Lewis Knepper 1920-1924, Rev. Haddon Q. Rhodes 1924-1942, Rev. Roy S. Forney 1942-1947, Rev. Quinten Evans summer of 1947, Rev. Austin Cooper 1947-1955, Rev. Herald V. Seese 1955-1967, Rev. Kenneth R. Blough 1967-1974 and Rev. Owen H. Preston 1974-1975.

In 1975 the Brothersvalley Congregation voted to close the doors at Rayman. The members at Rayman felt they were not ready to close at that time. The people at Rayman along with the district officers made the decision to keep it open. In 1977 the church was granted a fellowship status. It brought independence from the Brothersvalley Congregation (Rayman's Mother Church), and the name was changed to Rayman Fellowship Church of the Brethren. At that time enough money was raised to provide perpetual care for the cemetery. With 14 charter members we organized with the help of Rev. Robert L. Hoffman who came to be our minister in 1975. Rev. Hoffman served 1975-1985. Our present pastor Rev. William N. Hay was installed June 2, 1985. The work at Rayman has taken on new hope and attendance and membership has been increasing.

Some of the other families who were active and interested in the work of the Rayman Church since it was built in 1886. Raymans, Schrocks, Reitz's, Sarvers, Rosses, Piles, Rhodamer's, Bents, Beeghly's, Zerfosses, Trents and all of the present members.

THE E. D. LOWRY SIGN AND ITS INTERESTING HISTORY

above pictured reproduced sign that was painted by Charles Baltzer of Shanksville. During the summer of 1907 Charles Baltzer, a painter by trade, painted the original sign for his "older" friend, Ed Lowry to be placed on the side of the Lowry's small barn where houses now stand on the south shore near the breast of Lake Stonycreek. Some years later Ed and his wife, Mary Catherine "Kate" (Walker) Lowry built a large two-story home along Shanksville's main street with a small barn on the back part of their lot. The sign was transferred to the side of that barn in Shanksville. Sometime in early 1974 the sign was passed down to Ed and Kate's great grandson, F. Edward Lowry, who have lived in various places. Fifty years later in 2024 the sign was passed on to F. Edward and Angela Lowry's oldest grandchild, Miranda (Lowry) and her husband Steven Illius. They mounted it on the wall of their office in their two-story home in Columbia Station, Ohio.

Along with the reproduced sign, F. Edward Lowry has presented an interesting written history of the original sign and its passage down through the Lowry family. Ed Lowry, for whom the sign was built, was born in Shanksville on January 4, 1861. He died on November 10, 1940 at age 79. His son, William Welsh Lowry was the father Frank Edward "Tucker" Lowry, a Stonycreek Township farmer. Frank and his wife, Gladys (Glessner) Lowry were parents of four children: F. Edward Lowry, the donor of the reproduced sign, as well as Tom Lowry and their two sisters, Donna and Peggy.

Beachdale COB, St. Gregory, Berlin Alliance, Abundant Life, S.S. Peter and Paul, Three Seasons and Mt. Zion/Hay UCC on it. The second afghan contains Unity UCC, St. Mark, Shanksville UM, Mt. Olive, St. Paul UCC, Shanksville Assembly of God, Rayman COB, St. John, Mt. Olivet, Glen UCC, Trinity at Roxbury and New Hope UCC.
