


THE 86TH ANNUAL BERLIN BROTHERSVALLEY COMMUNITY FAIR — SEPTEMBER 10-13, 2025

NEW BOARD MEMBER OF THE BERLIN AREA HISTORICAL SOCIETY


We would like to welcome Robert "Bob" Ansell our newest Berlin representative to the board of directors of the Berlin Area Historical Society. After living in LaPlata, Maryland for 30 years, Bob became a permanent resident of Berlin to enjoy his retirement years in September 2023. Since then he has lost little time in becoming a member of the Berlin Area Historical Society, Berlin's Lions Club, the J. B. Schrock Playground Committee, and the Somerset County Rails to Trail Committee. He shared his interesting growing up years, schooling, early working experiences and his long teaching career during an interview with David Hay on September 17, 2025 to introduce himself for the October Curator's Report.

Looking for a place in southwestern Pennsylvania to get away from the hot, humid temperatures of LaPlata, he found his way to Somerset. His grandparents were from the Uniontown and Masontown areas where he has fond memories of spending time in his youth.

Not satisfied with settling in Somerset, he found Berlin by chance while he and his son traveled through the community on their way to look at Meyersdale properties. He found his current Berlin home in a community that impressed him for its tidy and well-kept homes. After looking at the property, he liked it and quickly decided to purchase the home However he couldn't move in October 1922. permanently until after his LaPlata home sold. For almost a year he traveled back and forth between the two properties before moving permanently to Berlin. He likes the quieter pace of Berlin in comparison to LaPlata, likening it to the Masontown and Uniontown areas that left a lasting impression on his younger years. Although he and his wife, the former Elesa Conner, planned to find a slower paced community for retirement, his wife, a former high school and middle school English teacher, passed away on July 4, 2022.

Bob and his wife are parents of three children: Emma and Hannah, both whom currently live in Berlin and son, Rob living in LaPlata where his late father and stepmother as well as siblings were living when Bob bought his Berlin home. In his

retirement, Bob enjoys playing chess, reading and gardening as well as community involvement. In

younger years, he was active in beach volleyball and basketball.

After living as a youngster in Capital Heights, Maryland, near Washington D.C., he followed his family during fourth grade in relocating to Waldorf, Maryland. Bob graduated in 1977 from Thomas Stone High School in Waldorf, Bob shared that during his middle schooling, high school, and early working career, he worked on a farm, in a restaurant and for an electrical supply company. For the latter job, he traveled to jobs sights delivering electrical and other supplies for housing projects. Bob sensed that older employees weren't always happy with their jobs but continued their employment in order to support their families. That encouraged Bob to look for a different profession which resulted in his decision to seek the teaching profession. He talked about experiencing early computer programming and substitute teaching to see if teaching would qualify as a possible field to follow.

After being away from school a number of years, Bob decided he was ready to pursue a future in education. He received his B.S. degree at Bowie State University and his Master's Degree at McDaniel College in Westminster, Maryland. By 1990 he was teaching special education in Charles County, Maryland. For 20 years he taught second, third, and fourth grade elementary school which was followed by nine years as a science teacher. His last 12 years were spent in elementary and middle schools, as a truant officer and social worker, being an advocate for homeless and student-families in Charles County, Maryland.

Bob Ansell fills the unexpired term of John F. Long, who was serving on the Board of Directors of the Berlin Area Historical Society at the time of his passing.

We look forward to Bob serving on the board of director and sharing new ideas and suggestions as we move forward to the exciting future of our historical society.



THE RAIL FENCING AT THE HUMBLE HOUSE!

On September 8, 2025 the new log fencing was erected around the Humble Log House at the Berlin Area Histrocial Society by a crew that consisted of Steve and Tammy Rohrs, Ken Miller, and Robert Ansell. The rail fence was made at the Mountain Craft Days the weekend before and hauled to Berlin by the Rohr family.

The log fencing was a goal for the late John F. Long, who was one of the key figures in the erection of the Humble House in memory of Terry Saylor. Money from John Long's memorial covered the cost of the log fencing.
